The Sputum Bowl, which is sponsored by the Pennsylvania Society for Respiratory Care, starts at the regional level. The LBI students competed against Respiratory Care programs from the western part of the state on March 6, 2020 at Carlow University. The win at the regional level November.

With the current COVID-19 outbreak among our country, we have thousands upon thousands of front line personnel leading the fight for our health and safety. Laurel is so proud to have graduates that are a part of that effort every day throughout our large range of healthcare graduates, but we had two graduates that uprooted for the time being to assist in a much larger way. We reached out to these graduates to get their stories to share. We are so proud of you both! Thank you to all the frontline healthcare workers, whether our graduates or not, we extend our gratitude!

#### Laura Brubacher - 2010 LBI Respiratory Therapy Graduate

I am currently working at New York-Presbyterian Hospital during the Covid-19 crisis.

My "why" came from losing my mother on 1-30-20 from liver cancer. She was a

retired nurse and loved it. Prior to her passing, she made arrangements to have her body donated to science. I knew this and wasn't in total agreement with her choice. However, this was her wish, so we honored it. It wasn't until I received her remains that I could finally understand her reasoning as to why she made that choice. With her selfless act to help

over millions of healthcare personnel learn, experience and grow from her passing. During that time COVID crisis hit our country hard. I knew as a Respiratory Therapist that I was called to jump in to do whatever I could to fight against it. She was and has been my inspiration throughout all of this.

My first day at New York-Presbyterian went a little something like this... a quick walk through looking at converted hallways of the hospital and over 500 patients, all COVID positive, on all different types of ventilators. I was in total

shock and fear and asked "what the heck am I really doing here?" That shock didn't last long at all because all of the staff needed everyone's help three days ago. I was told to help with the

ICU as the lead Respiratory Therapist was being pulled away to handle ten thousand other things. I stood there like my first day on our clinical rotation not having a clue what to do. A fellow RT said" great to have your support and help." He said "can you please take this vent patient to CT so I can help with another case?" It was then that I reminded myself of all I've learned and done over the past 10 years as

a Respiratory Therapist. You can go into any area, hospital or crisis all over the world, but the same remains true, take care of your patient first and all else will fall into place. We are currently down to 197 ventilator patients now. It's been so humbling, a blessing, an honor and an unbelievable learning experience in my career. I'm proud to be a LBI graduate and all I've done/continue to do as a Respiratory Therapist.

#### Austin Hardik - 2018 LBI Respiratory Therapy Graduate

I am currently a Registered Respiratory therapist with two and a half years' experience. I graduated from LBI in 2018 and had been a Full-Time Registered Respiratory Therapist

at UPMC Shadyside after graduation. I recently took upon the challenge to leave my family and go help with the coronavirus pandemic at the University of Miami Hospital.

During this time of uncertainty in the healthcare system I was unsure what I

really was getting myself into, but I wanted to help and make a difference in one of the more affected areas during the pandemic. I thought it was my calling and one of the reasons I went to school to be a Respiratory Therapist was to help people in need. During my time at the University of Miami, I worked every day in a makeshift COVID ICU with usually one other therapist covering 60 beds where they converted a general medical-surgical floor into all COVID positive inpatient beds. Every patient that came into the hospital was tested for the coronavirus and depending on the patient's needs and care, they determined if a patient would go to the intensive care unit or to a step down COVID unit

Patients coming to the intensive care unit varied in age from thirty years old to the elderly in their 90s, mostly all in respiratory distress and with low oxygen saturations. The majority of the patients that were coming to the ICU, along with the patients that were already there, had to be intubated and placed on life support because they would eventually tire out. Every time we had a new admission or had to enter the ICU to see patients you had to don/doff the appropriate PPE that took about five minutes just to put on in a certain order with an observer watching you to make sure you're doing it properly.

The University of Miami Hospital did a great job with the PPE, ensuring staff would be well protected as best as we could be by giving us bunny suits that covered your entire body along with a N95 mask and face shield

when you're caring for a patient and you're right at their airway placing an endotracheal tube. Sometimes you would spend 4 hours straight with a skin tight mask that made it hard for you to breathe yourself, taking care of patients requiring a very high level of monitoring or constant care from intubations, proning or even coding

a patient.

Every day was emotionally hard and stressful for all staff, but teamwork and communication is so important, especially during these times in bedside patient care with COVID-19 patients. You have to be able to communicate to all members of the team and think quickly as every second is critical. Caring for these sick patients has been very challenging as well as working in a new environment with different ventilators than I am used to and new staff. But it makes me think how hard it was on the patient having no family members or visitors to come comfort them in their time of need, so as a bedside clinician you have to be everything for them, just not your role as an RT anymore.

I have to say after the past two months working in a critical care COVID-19 unit in Miami as a Respiratory Therapist I wouldn't change my experience for anything. I've learned and grown as a Respiratory Therapist and as a person. My advice for the new graduating RT students... study like you're going to make an impact on someone's life and not just to pass an exam and if you're eager and passionate about what you do, I would suggest once you're confident in your skills and knowledge be brave and take on a new challenge. It's been an emotional but very rewarding two months.


